# Open For Everyone Welfare Organization

National Volunteer Programme's partner institution, Open For Everyone, is working to provide education, health, entertainment, protection and employment to street children through their Street To School project. The Project Head Mr. Muhammed Hassan Ghoghari believes that the reason for the increase in child labor and drug addiction cases is the lack of opportunities in the underprivileged areas. Currently, they have over 200 students enrolled and are working on further increasing the number.



They not only work on street children rather they want to eradicate illiteracy and poverty from its core, this is why they not only educate them but also help to improve their living conditions by educating their parents, creating awareness, conducting training and lots more.

Belonging to a Memon community I've always had many opportunities but the children living in the underprivileged area are not blessed with them which maybe the reason why they indulge in bad habits. We not only work on children but also their parents and for that, we have a separate project where we ask the parents of these children about what they can do and support them financially and then keep a check and balance on it so that they're sustained not only for the time being but life. ### Special Olympics Pakistan



#### Special Olympics

National Volunteer Programme's official partner Special Olympics Pakistan was founded in 1989 and has over 17000 athletes registered today. SOP sports training and athletic competition for all type sports, for children and adults with an intellectual disability, giving them continuing opportunities to develop physical fitness.

This organization has many noticeable stories to tell but one of the most inspiring story of Parvez Ahmed, native of Gilgit-Baltistan was the sole bread earner of his family and used to carry freshly cut wheat on his back which contributed in his athletic stamina and capabilities. He represented Pakistan in Special Olympics in Austria held in March 2017 and won two silver medals. Moreover, he shares a very strong bond with his coach Amna Baig who refers to Parvez as 'Captain' in the trainings. Generally when he is down this nickname does the trick and he works 10 times harder than he normally does! His only concerns are his mother's health and making her proud of his achievements.
